I used Jesse Liberty, *Learning C#*, for a group of new students who had very little to no programming experience. It worked well. A somewhat more advanced version for those with more OOP experience is his *Programming C#*. They are both O'Reilly books. The emphasis is heavy on the language concepts leaving most of the GUI for you to learn. But I think that is the way it should be. I've seen intro books that go the other route and students come out not learning much C#, just having fun making a few widgets.
