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You needn't really worry about a corrupt database. They're fairly rare unless you have something (such as a file-level anti-virus product) mucking about with the .edb file.

A corrupt database will generally not mount. If this happens, my recommendation is to call Microsoft Product Support Services (well worth the +/- \$300) and have them help you.

The transaction log files are a record of the transactions that have taken place on the Microsoft Exchange server, they are only read from when the is restarted after it was not cleanly shut down or as part of a disaster recovery.

The best and recommended way to delete the

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log files is to perform a full online Exchange aware backup of the Microsoft Exchange server using an Exchange Aware backup program and the backup program will remove the log files once they have been successfully backed up. They should never be manually deleted !!

You should never turn on circular logging on a mailbox server as this will stop you being able to recover to the point of failure, you will only be able to recover up to the last backup point. It should only be enabled on bridgehead servers where there are no mailboxes and the messages are simply in transit, through the server.
