There's a better way to 'push' content these days than using a web page. Its called RSS (Really Simple Syndication) which is actually a huge trend you should know about. The content can be made to be displayed in web pages. When the page loads it only has the most updated content. Most however are using 'readers' such as RSS Bandit. Maybe you've seen the little orange icons on web pages lately? Consuming the 'feed' in a web page generally requires scripting skills which is why readers remain the most useful at the moment.
