Thanks for the response, but what you've described isn't what I'm looking for. I'd like to have IIS automatically attempt to validate the user against DOMAIN1, DOMAIN2, DOMAIN3 etc. so that the user doesn't have to specify the domain and a backslash before their username when logging on to the website. I don't want IIS to use just a single Default Domain, I want it to attempt to validate the user against all the trusted domains on the network. The users don't like having to specify their domain when logging on to the web site.

>*In Web, FTP, and NNTP servers, the DefaultLogonDomain property is used to specify the default domain that the server uses to authenticate users (in a Web hosting scenario where UserIsolationMode = 2). If the value of DefaultLogonDomain is not specified, the default domain will be the domain name controlled by the computer, if the computer is a domain controller. If the computer is not a domain controller, the default domain will be the computer name.*

>*In the case of FTP, IIS uses this domain name to query the corresponding Active Directory (AD) for the two properties required for each user in the Web hosting scenario: msIIS-FTPRoot and msIIS-FTPDir.*
