Hi Steve,

If the server named change you can use the script/registry change in the prior article to add a location that the MS Installer (used by Office 2000 and newer) uses to locate a 'home' (source) install location. It's used for autorepairing, roaming users and features that may not be used 'until used' by a particular machine or user.

You can also use the procedure here, but it's involving each workstation and a recache.

If MS Office was installed from an Office Admin Point on a server then it stored the server name as part of the value and the MS Installer is basically expecting to find a connection to its installation source for feature repair etc. This article may be helpful to you.
