I am new to using sql server 2005 management studio. The sql server 2005 management studio is connected to a sql server 2000 standard edition database. Problem: the default schema name for me on sql server 2005 management studio desktop version is xx/user. This tool will not allow me to create a View and/or table with the schema name as dbo.

How do you recommend that I solve this problem?

Assuming your database is using objects only in the dbo schema here is what you would run for each user:

```
ALTER USER <Username/> WITH DEFAULT_SCHEMA=dbo.
```
