Yes you can change the order and timing of

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the applications. You will need to use your own skill to determine how much time is needed for each application. It may help by spacing the start of each app by a given number of seconds (say 15 for starters) and then use Windows Task Manager to monitor the CPU Usage percentage, after each app loads the percentage should drop to near zero, just count the seconds for each app and adjust the spacing accordingly.

You may find AutoRuns useful in that it will show you what loads during each part of the Boot and logon cycle.
