Hello Brandon,  
\$LDR\$ is setup loader rather than NTLDR,  
During the initial portions of Setup \$LDR\$ is loaded. When setup completes, \$LDR\$ is supposed to be deleted as in \swin\_nt\$.~bt and \swin\_nt\$.~ls  
So during setup the bootsector points to \$ldr\$ rather than NTLDR  
The content of both files would be very similar other than the differences required for setup.
