One link found with the above Google Search states, "Apple says, it "Provides the interface to Apple mobile devices."", so one could take other parts of your postings and assume that you, in fact, do not need this particular application/service. You are insistent about 'not own or use any Apple products...'

"Apple Software Update"...

One link found with the above Google Search states, "installs the latest version of Apple software on computers", so one could take other parts of your postings and assume that you, in fact, do not need this particular application/service. However – you are still insistent that you do not own or use any Apple products, although the next part of your posting seems to contradict that...

"Quicktime"...

Not that the two other bits of software weren't Apple products (that you do not own or use), but this is likely how they got installed. At some point you (or someone on your computer or perhaps the manufacturer) installed Apple Quicktime. It would have – by default – installed the rest. Perhaps you visited a web page that had a quicktime video and just told it that it was okay to install whatever you needed – who knows. In any case...

One link found with the above Google Search states that Quicktime is "a multimedia framework developed by Apple Inc. capable of handling various formats of digital video, media clips, sound, text, animation, music, and several types of interactive panoramic images.", which is correct.

"If I use Windows Media Player do I still need Quicktime?"...

Open-ended question. No one can accurately answer it without putting limitations of some sort on it.

First – Windows Media Player *will not* natively play all formats of video/audio you might run into out in the real world. There are just too many. And sometimes – it might play them, but not as well.

Secondly – What version of Windows Media Player are we even talking about here? One can assume (but it is an assumption) that you are running Windows XP, so you probably have either v9, 10 or 11 of Windows Media Player... You could also be using some version of Windows Media Player Classic (6.4)...

Some animations and such on various web pages are not going to be visible to you without Quicktime or perhaps an alternative made to replace it:

How do you utilize Windows Media Player and what do you use your computer for and do you foresee ever – in your lifetime with this computer – changing what you might need on it?

The short answer is, "Maybe, maybe not. That answer is something only you can come up with as we have no information to support any answer, one way or another."

"Silverlight"...

One link found with the above Google Search states that Silverlight "provides graphical and animation display, with multimedia and interactivity built in". Some call it "Microsoft's competition with Adobe's Flash product"...

The short answer to several of your questions are the same.
