Not if there is NO C:\Documents and Settings\Guest folder and no record in the registry for the Guest 501 SID.
When doing a Copy, you need the ntuser.dat file and subsequent support folders under C:\Documents and Settings\Guest.

I thought I may have missed that, but I've just read through the entire correspondence that is still visible here and I can't find where Jerry says there's no guest account... In fact, he says: "This did not solve the problem. I can turn the guest account off, but do not know how to delete the guest account." Clearly this implies that there IS a guest account??

If the new account works, you can then duplicate your Guest account profile (which would include your My Documents, Favorites, Start Menu and other folders) onto the new account.

Jerry stated that there is no Guest account to Copy from. No C:\Documents and Settings\Guest\....
And the Registry ProfileList does not reflect the Guest SID.

From your post, I gather you only have the Administrator

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and Guest
accounts... I agree with "NewScience" – the profile may
have become
corrupt. However, deleting the account doesn't delete the
profile...

You say you created a new account with admin rights, but it
didn't
solve
your problem – could you be more specific? Do you mean
that you got
the
same error message when logging on using the newly created
account? Or
was
that successful, but the Guest account still didn't work?

If the new account works, you can then duplicate your Guest
account
profile
(which would include your My Documents, Favorites, Start
Menu and other
folders) onto the new account. Right-click My Computer,
click User
Profiles, select the Guest account profile and click Copy To...
You
can
then browse to the C:\Documents and Settings folder and
select the new
user
account name. Otherwise, you can manually copy My
Documents,
Favorites,
etc.
