Hi dea,  
First, it is my Recommendation to you the Kelly–kornet not Joe, sorry for the trouble.  
I can't see why it screwed up, but if it a clean install I will try to see the sound card is seated firmly in it's slot and clean the Dust by air compressed can or blow gently out of the Case.  
Try to follow these steps for clean install and if it is expansion card, try to get the CD/DVD or Floppy for the driver and pay attention when windows install and ask for driver and you can select I have a disk , that if the sound card is n't defective for some reason!.

If you wish you can Boot into safe Mode by tapping the F8 and do a system restore before the registry changes took place.

...I don't have an Integrated Sound card. It is a PCI Creative Sound Blaster, and is in a PCI slot on the system board. I don't understand how it(Legacy) ever got installed. Any ideas will be appreciated...
