Hi,

that are configured the same way. I was wondering if anyone could help me remove all of the current group policies, all of them, I will redo them after I know the servers are stable. Any ideas, suggestions or instructions would be greatly appreciated.

First of all, you should try to find out, which policies are causing your trouble. If you are running windows server 2003 than start rsop.msc on it an take a look on the report. Than you should see the relevant policy. Try to deactivate the policy (you can delete it later) with the GPMC.

BTW the default domain policy and the default domain controllers policy can be redone with either dcgpfifix on w2k3 or with recreatedefpol on w2k.
