EDIT: Also another thing to check is to be sure they (the files you are attempting to insert to your e-mail messages) are set correctly in the file types area located under tools/folder options in any Windows Explorer window. The file type should be \*.jpe if I remember correctly, and the file type should include files with the extension \*.jpg and \*.jpeg – the capitalization of the extension should NOT make a difference, as far as I remember, but please verify that with someone better equipped to answer that specific question.

If neither of the previous replies/answers has helped, may I suggest that you try adding them as ATTACHMENTS instead of inserting them into the text of the message itself? Sometimes this works better, and if the recipient of your message has their e-mail reader setup in a similar fashion, the end result would more than likely be your desired end result. This often works for me this way, and I almost always send myself a test copy of the e-mail before I send it to others I want to send this way as a way of previewing the layout and content. The only time it doesn't work so far that I can see, is when the recipient's e-mail reader program is setup with the "View inline images" option de-selected (If I remember correctly, that's in the options section, but right now, as you can see from my current thread, I can't very easily verify that for you at the current time.)

Also, be sure that you save the images locally prior to any attempt to send via e-mail, as sometimes the program will attempt to use a cached image from the source, and in some cases, depending on your method of import, could be non-accessible at the time of sending (if it's still on your CF card, for example). Another thing I would suggest, if you're not already using it, is to use the NikonView program (I believe it's still at version 6 for the best results), and I believe that newer purchases of Nikon cameras come with another newer program that has similar, but not as extensive, features. In said program you have the option of sending via e-mail, so long as you set it up to use your default (or desired) e-mail reader program.

I have dozens of photographs made by my (former-) Sony digital camera. I can import them (not as an attachment, but in the text area, by means of the import-button (correct in English?).

Shortly I got a Nikon D50 camera and I made brilliant photo's with it. I would send some to friends. I was very astonished: a red (small) cross appears on the spot I want to import a photograph.

The only difference between a Sony filename and a Nikon filename is \*.jpg and Nikon \*.JPG. I changed that, but again I could not import the photograph in the text. Who can explain that, and how can I change that problem? Experts under the readers? Thank you so much!
