The part after c:\documents and settings should be your user login ID, and that's the way Windows normally organizes user data. However, I ignore that and use my own directories. Specifica applications, such as those in office, can be set so that their default directory is something different (I keep everything under D:\DATA). Basically, you should be able to create whatever directory structure you want, and put your photos there. The software you use to move your photos from your camera may or may not remember that directory from run to run.
