> Restricted Groups

> This security setting allows an administrator to define two properties for

> security-sensitive groups (or restricted groups). The two properties are

> Members and Member Of.

>

> The Members list defines exactly who belongs and who does not belong to

> the restricted group. Both inclusion on the list and exclusion from the

> list, are enforced.

>

> The Member Of list specifies groups in which the restricted group is

> included. Only inclusion in the Member Of list is enforced, not exclusion:

> If you remove a group from the Member Of list, the restricted group is

> allowed to remain a member of the removed group.

> . Misuse of this policy setting is a common error that can cause data

> loss or problems with data access or security.
