Enforced policies override other policies with the same setting applied after that one.

For example:

In domain policy you have 1 policy option that says "Setting01=TRUE" then in the OU

you have another policy that says "Setting01=FALSE"

the Option "Setting01=FALSE" wins because the policies are applied in the following order:

Local Policy -> Site -> Domain -> OU -> Sub OU, etc...

But if you enforce the domain policy in this case the "Setting01=TRUE" wins because is being enforced.

- Where did you linked the GPO that disables the FW?
- Run the RsOP.msc from the workstation cmd line.
- The RSOP.msc shows you what policies are being applied at that

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workstation,
but you can't use it to change the policy, is just a tool that allows you
to
see if the policy that you created in the domain is in fact being
applied.

- Run from cmd, -> gpupdate /force
- Check if the GPO is being applied by using Rsop.msc on the Workstations.
- Also search for errors in eventlog
