We want to separate the functions of domain admins and enterprise admins, so the former cannot make themselves enterprise admins. When I do this in a new AD created in newly installed 2003 R2 servers, the domain admins keep modify perms rights, as they are the owners. So I change the ownership to Enterprise Admins and put an explicit deny on the enterprise objects, which are in their own OU. Within minutes some system process goes through and restores the default permissions. What's the point of having separation of rights when the system thinks it knows best? Beside that point, how do I stop this behavior? Is there some security template somewhere that I need to modify?

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
