Thanks for your posting and thank Rich for the answer

General, after the VPN connection was created, the client would still try to use the DNS on ISP first, if it fails, the SBS internal DNS will be used. So, It is not necessary to use the hosts file.

If you do not want to the network traffic go through the SBS server, you can just following the suggestion from Rick to change the default gateway.
