- > Windows knows them by their user SID. Devices in the domain have a machine
- > SID. There are other SIDs but we don't need to go into it here.

- > I'm wondering how you have managed to get the two SBS's into the same domain
- > (sortof). I'll guess that you have installed both to the same domain name
- > (say company.local), one SBS believes is in the domain SID1, the other is in
- > SID2, even though the name displayed to us is company.local on both.
