> *when you want to set file permissions of every computer in an AD domain or OU, you can use scripting (of course). For this special purpose, however, you can work with standard Group Policy mechanisms.*

> *To set the permission on a set of folders or files, open the appropriate Group Policy for the machines in that OU, and navigate to "Computer Configuration – Windows Settings – Security Settings – File System". Here, add the folder or file where you want to configure permissions. Please be aware that this is a computer setting, so the Policy that contains your file permission settings must apply to computer accounts.*
