If i try to start regedit it say.. File not found.

But i manage to start regedit in safe mode as real admin.

Most important update does not work now.

All this started when i got a upupdate some month's ago.

The uppgrade was ActiveX Killbits. KB950760

I Can't do anything that must enable Admin rights. Like upgrade and install.

Not even Administrator can enable Admin right.

Ps.

I have a identical computer on my office. This one still work.

Disable Spybot Tea Timer and leave it disabled for the time being (i.e., until you get all of your problems sorted and SP1 installed). See <http://aumha.net/viewtopic.php?t=32409>

NB: If you don't fully understand what Tea Timer does and how it does it, leave it permanently disabled.

Once you get the BSOD issues sorted and if you're still having problems installing Vista SP1 via Windows Update (don't try it manually, please), open a free support incident.

PS: The only other thread of yours that I can find doesn't involve the BSOD errors.

Yes Teatimer is enabled, but I'm not aware of Adaware's Guard Service and certainly didn't configure it.

Have already put blue–screen info on another thread. Will try to fix that first (not that I haven't tried already, but like this, I've followed "fix–it" instructions to no avail and am mighty sick of Vista right now!) before I trying to fix this, but would like info in advance on how to go about it. Right now I can't ever see Vista running even half–properly.

Is Spybot Tea Timer enabled?

Is Ad–Aware's Guard service running in the background when you attempt to install SP1?

What "blue screen" (BSOD) errors are you getting? I would STRONGLY recommend get those issues resolved before attempting to installed SP1 again.
