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Ctrl+F6 and Ctrl+Shift+F6 will cycle forward and back through open documents, or you can access the Window menu with your keyboard: Alt, W, then the number of the desired document.

> > Re-register Word. I can't remember for sure, but I think for Word97 you need
> > to:
> > Start/Run
> > Type: winword.exe /r
> >
> > Then let it run. You should get a message that Word has been registered.
> >
> > As to the original question: if the /w switch isn't doing what you need, then I
> > don't know of any way to force Word to start a new instance each time.
> > Microsoft has specifically programmed the Office applications to NOT do that.
> > The /w switch *does* work from the command line or as part of a short-cut
> > target, which is why I thought it might work, otherwise.
> >
> > And when programming code, we generally use the CreateObject function or the
> > New key word.
